I will give you at least ten days' notice before you are required to bring the book to class. ** For Pygmalion, you need the Literary Touchstone Classic edition ISBN9781580493994 . I recommend ordering from Prestwick House—very inexpensive student book source.

Here is what you need for our class – very much like what you needed last year.

One notebook that is dedicated to English. This can be spiral bound or binder—your choice. But you need an 8.5 by 11-inch notebook, not a small one.

Lots of pens in black and dark blue ink. You won't be writing in pen during English class, and you won't be writing papers in colored ink. If you want to use a pencil or colored pen for your notes, that is fine.

But you'll have to remember to switch over to black or blue ink if you are writing an assignment that will be turned in to me. **NO RED INK PENS!**

Plenty of lined notebook paper (loose leaf paper).

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Full length outside readings – During the school year, we will read a number of full-length works outside of class. I'm still working on the final list...but the first one will be The Odyssey by Homer. **You must use the W.H.D. Rouse translation.** This is the book that has been used in the past, and you may be able to buy or borrow a copy from one of last year's seniors. Or you can order your own. I recommend you use Prestwick House (a student book supplier)—copies are less than \$5.
